

CREATE NON-SKID TEXTURE USING WHOLE-WHEAT FLOUR

THE ROUGH SURFACES SEEN ON TANKS AND AIRCRAFT WALKWAYS is easily made with coarse flour from your pantry (also called stone-ground, whole-wheat, or whole-grain). It's simple to apply and paint over and looks realistic to boot.



To demonstrate the process, we'll use Academy's 1/35 scale Merkava Mk.IV main battle tank built by Karel Sutt for the March 2017 *FineScale Modeler*. He created a roughed-up look with layers of chipped paint.



First, spread thinned white glue over the area that will be non-skid. Then sprinkle on the coarse flour liberally and sweep away the excess with a soft brush.



Be sure to avoid parts of the model that should not have the bumpy texture, such as sides, ventilation covers, indentations, and other details.



Use reference photos to determine how even and closely spaced the non-skid texture should be. Here, unevenness and bare patches add to the realistic appearance.



Only begin painting when the flour is completely dry. The texture can stand up to both airbrushing and hand-painting techniques. Use caution when weathering the area though, as the flour can't tolerate the same chipping motion as untreated surfaces.



In the end, you're left with a realistically rough texture that is to scale and stands up to several layers of paint.
